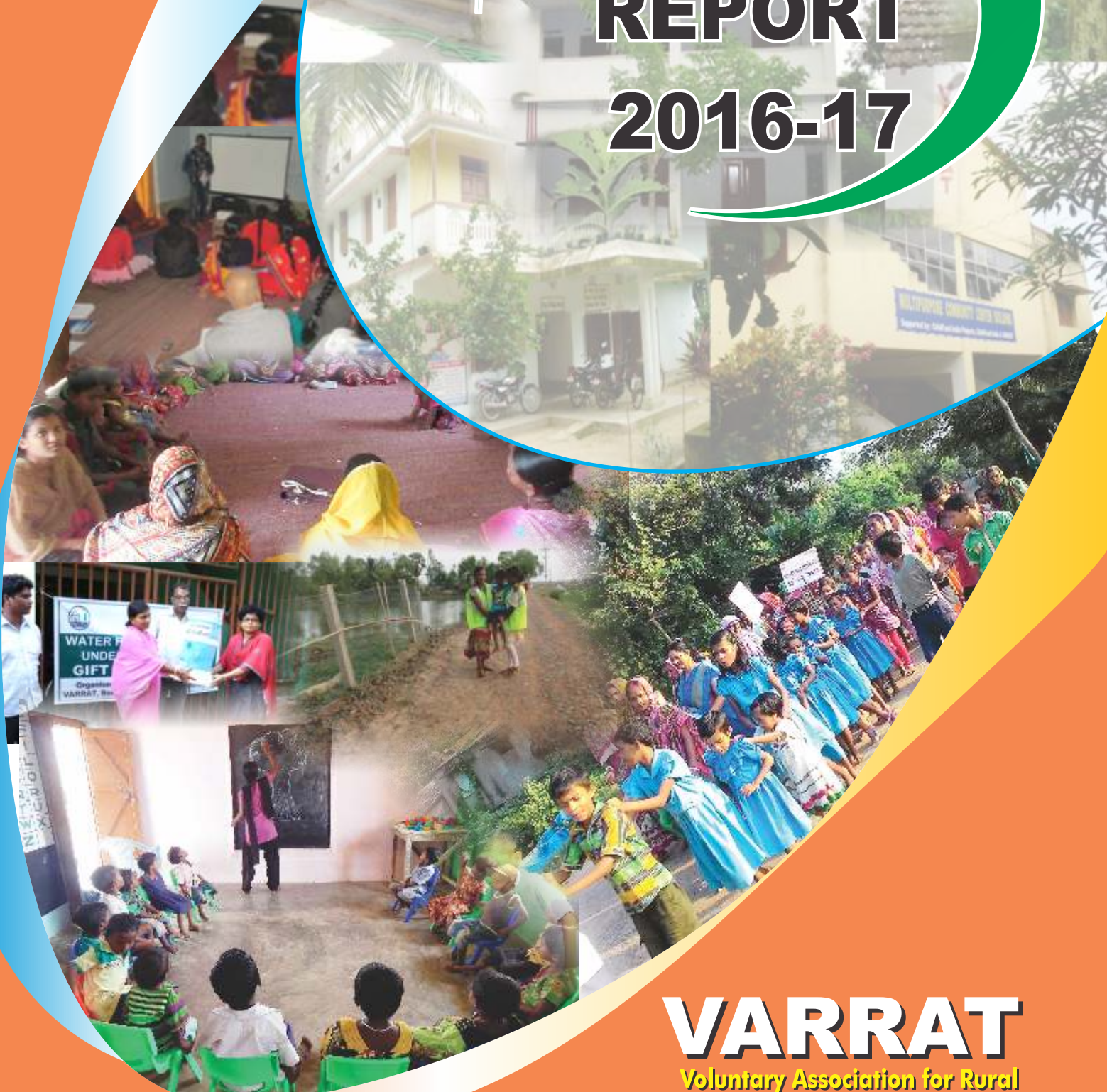

PRELUDE

Voluntary Association for Rural Reconstruction & Appropriate Technology (VARRAT) is a non-profit making developmental organizations, came into existence way back in 1983 due to the strenuous efforts a group of committed development professionals, village level volunteers with the mandate to work for the betterment of the vulnerable, marginalized and underprivileged sections in the remote areas of Odisha being inspired by the ideology and philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi, Father of the Nation.

As a legal entity VARRAT got registered under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 bearing No. 4444/114 in 1986. Subsequently it was registered under Section 12A of the Income Tax in the year 1995, bearing No. Jud 1/47/12A, and having FCRA bearing No.104860055.

To reach its target constituencies, VARRAT has established its head office at Boulakani in Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district with its extended branch office at Erendei in Patna block of Keonjhar district of Odisha.

Since its inception, VARRAT has adopted the approach of empowering the communities by enhancing the capacities and skills of their associations and federations to help themselves to bring a sustainable positive impact in the area of local resource management, sustainable livelihood, health & sanitation, education, child development, youth development and women development.

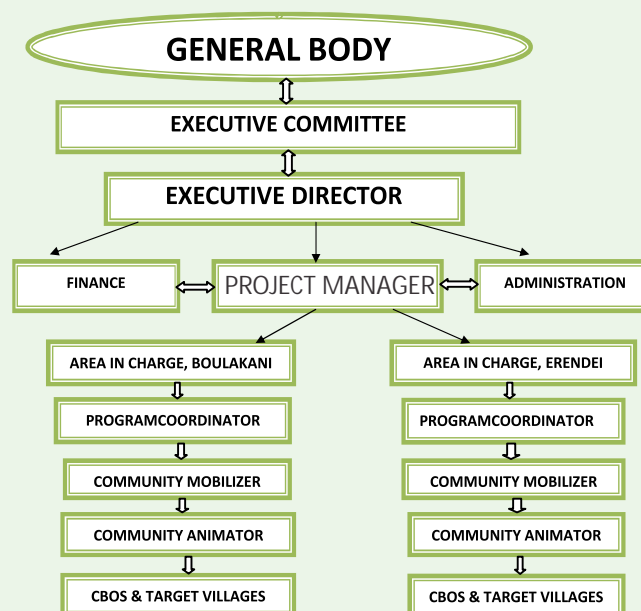

Structure and Governance System

For efficient management, a vibrant Governing Body is constituted with 7 members headed by the Chairperson. It includes other office bearers such as Director, Secretary and Treasurer and three member. The Director is responsible to act as the Chief Executive to look after the day-to-day functioning with the help of a Project Manager and other staff members down the line. The roles & responsibilities for all the office bearers have been elaborated in the bye-laws. The governing body meetings are held quarterly to review the progress and plan for the future. AGM (Annual General Body Meeting) is organized on yearly basis to approve the plan of action, budget and to take the major policy decisions.

Organogram

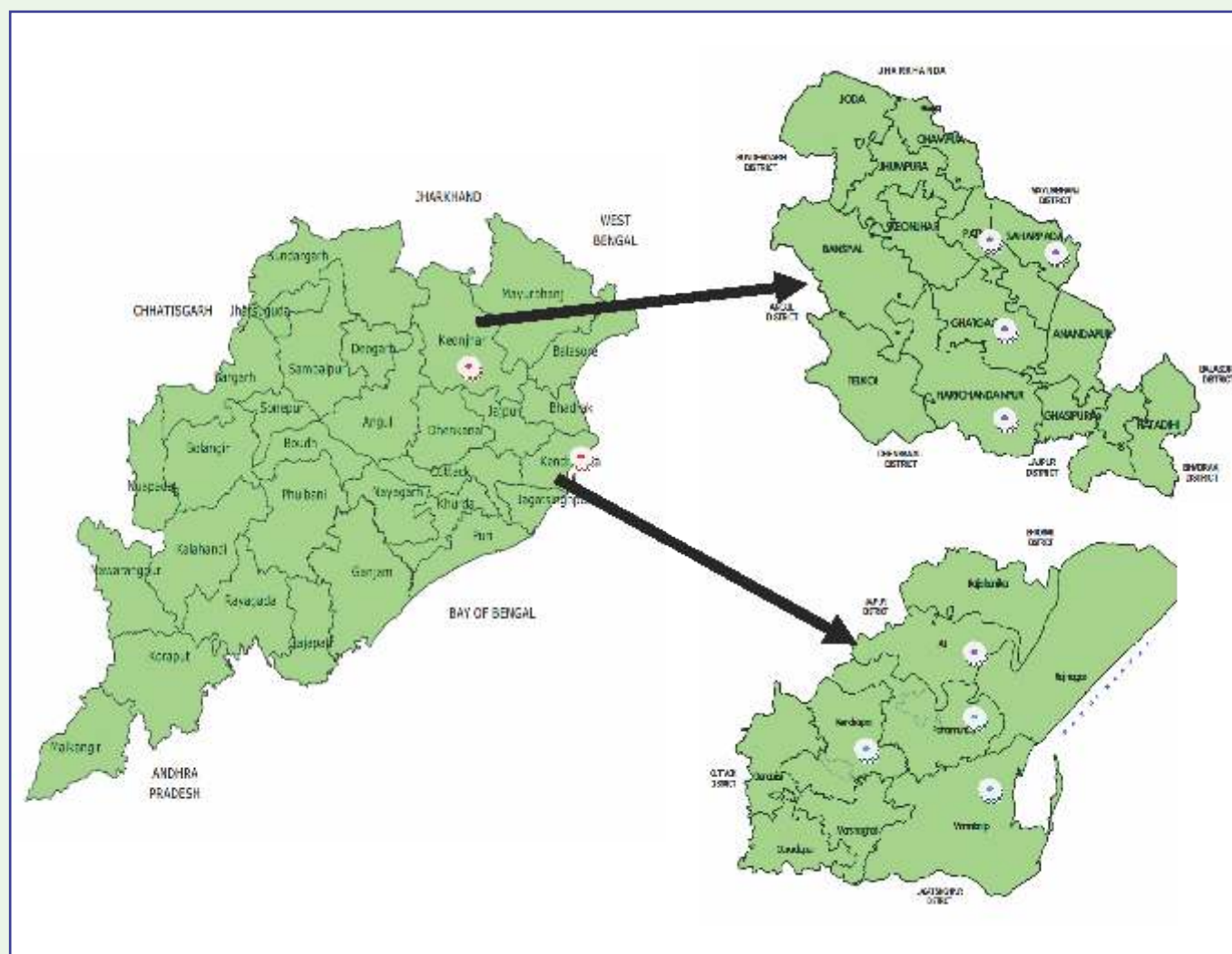


Geographical Coverage and Constituency

VARRAT, since its inception has laid emphasis on intensive community engagement to ensure that the primary stakeholders in general and marginalised sections like the poor and deprived sections in particular with a visible physical presence in total 201 villages catering 42149 families of Mahakalpada, Pattamundai, Aul, Kendrapara Blocks of Kendrapara District and Patna, Sadar(Keonjhar), Ghatagaon and Harichandanpur blocks of Keonjhar District, Odisha.

Brief profile of the operational areas of VARRAT



(MAP OF OPERATIONAL AREAS)

It is relevant to divulge that both the target districts are unique and different from each other in terms of geographical situation, climatic conditions, economy, culture and traditions. While Keonjhar district is situated in the North of Odisha falling in the continuation of Chhotnagpur plateau area, Kendrapara district is located in the East of the State coming under the coastal belt. Keonjhar is rich in high mineral and dense forest resources with the operational areas dominated by the indigenous tribal. Contrary to this Kendrapara district is known for its coastal ecology and bio-resources with the target areas mainly inhabited by the marginal farmers, fisherman community, scheduled castes and migrants from West Bengal and Bangladesh. However both the districts are now vulnerable due to climate change factors, depletion of resource bases and loosing of traditional livelihood mechanisms.

PROGRAMATIC INTERVENTIONS

With the passage of time and changing scenario in the developmental ambit, VARRAT has made some amendments in the style of working but has not deviated much from the original mandate of focusing on Local resource management, empowerment of the target communities & institutions and addressing the basic issues like health, sanitation, education and developing human resources. The target areas of interventions are rich in local resources. Looking into it VARRAT has adopted simple strategy to manage the local resources effectively with the local communities by making them aware and upgrading their skills to conserve, protect and manage those for supporting their livelihood support systems. During this year main focus was on sustainable livelihood promotion, quality seed conservation & use and capacitating lead farmers to blend new techniques for better yield. The

major commendable achievements accomplished this year are elaborated below.

Improved Farming For Better Nutrition Intake:

Agriculture is the mainstay of livelihood support system of the inhabitants of the target areas in Keonjhar, though Forest also contributes significantly to it. With a view to enable the local farmers to yield more, sincere efforts are taken by VARRAT.

A unique Randomized Control Trial (RCT) project 'Up-scaling Participatory Action and Videos for Agriculture and Nutrition (UPAVAN)' is implemented by VARRAT with the financial support of LSHTM (London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine) through Digital Green wherein D-Cor, University College of London, SPRING (Leading Nutrition Organisation from USA) and JSI are the research and technical partners. The project has four arms. First being Agriculture + NSA, the second is Agriculture + NSA + MIYCN, the third is Agriculture + NSA + MIYCN + PLA and the fourth is the control arm. While all the arms are being implemented by VARRAT, the third arm has a partnership with Ekjut that promotes Participatory Learning and Action (PLA). Under the project 1000 day women house visits are conducted and video dissemination on relevant topics takes place in every 15 days. The data pertaining to the project activities are uploaded in COCO- software and the information are displayed in Dashboard. The project is implemented in 190 villages of Patna, Ghatagaon, Harichandanpur and Sadar block of Keonjhar district. The villages selected are untouched villages of VARRAT DG system and Ekjut PLA. The village selection is done by the Research Team of LSHTM on the basis of the village list submitted to them through a randomized system. The main objective of this project is to identify and explore barriers and opportunities to optimize

Nutrition-Sensitive Agriculture (NSA) and Maternal Infant Young Children Nutrition (MIYCN). Conscious attempt is made to empower the target communities through digital technology with the innovative approach of 'doing by watching'.



The achievements of the Project are :

- ❖ SELECTION/IDENTIFICATION OF VILLAGES was a tough task because the villages enlisted which are not touched by any of the Implementing Organisations-VARRAT and Ekjut for Arm wise Randomization.
- ❖ CONSENT LETTER collected from the village people and PRI representatives for implementing the program in their villages.
- ❖ LISTING OF CHILDREN from the community below 23 months and verifying the data with Anganwadi information across all the 138 villages.
- ❖ RECRUITMENT OF CSP's done in a process i.e. applications were collected from the villages where the programs will be implemented followed by Interview process with the participation of VARRAT and Ekjut senior staffs.
- ❖ INDUCTION TRAINING was conducted to make the new staffs acquainted with the thoughts of VARRAT and the programs



- ❖ PROJECT PLANNING AND REVIEW to start the implementation was conducted and all the aspects of the project discussed.
- ❖ DISSEMINATION TRAINING organized to make the CSP's familiar with the system of dissemination, handling of PICO.
- ❖ PARTNER'S MEET VARRAT, Ekjut and DG were organised once in two months on a regular basis to review the status of implementation & progress.
- ❖ TRAINING OF TRAINERS ON MIYCN AND NSA AND FIELD LEVEL TRAINING organised by the team of SPRING personnel for selected staffs of VARRAT and DG to undertake the field level trainings and based on that the field level training organised for CSP's AWW & ASHA's of Program villages.
- ❖ REVIEW MEETINGS are organised twice a month (once in 15 days) to assess the progress and plan for the next month.
- ❖ PARTICIPATORY LEARNING AND ACTION (PLA) is implemented in one arm. For the CSP's of that arm, a special training was organised by Ekjut on how to organise the meetings smoothly.



- ❖ VILLAGE/CLUSTER LEVEL LAUNCHING EVENTS were conducted in all the villages and clusters to make the people aware of the program.
- ❖ QUALITY ASSURANCE VISITS are conducted by the Block/Arm Coordinators, Program Coordinator on a regular basis with the specified mechanism and procedure.
- ❖ D-Cor has completed the Base Line study in collaboration with LSHTM, whereas formative research done by of SPRING in collaboration with VARRAT.

EMPOWERING THE ELDERS TO LIVE WITH DIGNITY:

In the human life cycle, old age seems to be most delicate stage. In this stage a person after serving throughout the life needs care, support and most importantly self-esteem. Hence with this commitment VARRAT, being supported by Help-Age India, has launched a programme, called "ASTITVA", with the intention of enabling elderly persons of both sex attaining the age of 55 years, to be economically self-reliant and to lead active, healthy and dignified life in 21 villages of 6 GP's in Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district.

Revolving fund support	Total 50 ESHGs, after assessing the micro business plans, are provided with revolving fund of Rs.5,00,000/- i.e. Rs.10,000/-per group for carrying out livelihood programme through the members.
Linkages	❖ 55 ESHGs are linked with different financial institutions for availing fund for their income generating activities.
	❖ Handholding support was provided to 55 ESHGs for linkages with National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM)

It is worthwhile to mention that total 55 ESHGs are formed and imparted with handholding support at regular interval for asserting their elderly rights and accessing social security schemes designed for them such as: old age & widow pension, IAY, PMJDY, PMSBY etc. A significant amounts of

Rs. 3,32,154/- has been generated from the members as their group savings which are used by themselves to meet the pressing need. One of the visible achievements is that 3 village level federations are acting as producer groups to secure the interest of the elders specifically.

TARGETED INTERVENTION FOR PREVENTION & CONTROL OF HIV/AIDS:

Kendrapara is one of the economical growing districts of the state as it is the gateway to Paradeep port and tourist place of Bhitarkanika sanctuary. It is also happened to be a notorious place because of unethical activities including human trafficking and prostitution. However unsafe sex in many cases leads to different fatal contagious diseases like Reproductive Tract Infection (RTI), Sexual Transmitted Diseases (STD), HIV/AIDS etc. The incidence is on the increasing trend. To prevent and control the spread of HIV/AIDS, VARRAT with the support of OSACS, has taken a package programme in the high risk areas of Aul, Pattamundai NAC and Kendrapara Municipality area. The support of the health



departments at district and CHC level is one of the key contributing factors for implementing the programme successfully. The significant achievements under this programmes during the reporting period are depicted below.

Behavioral Change in Communication programme and creating enabling environment	❖ 10993 persons are contacted personally by Peer Educators and made aware on safe sex practices and STD, HIV/AIDS.
	❖ 84 nos. of hotspot level meeting and assessment of awareness level of participants done on STD, HIV/AIDS transmission & prevention, adoption of safe sex practices and treatment facilities. It was followed with providing updated knowledge to increase their awareness level.
	❖ Four advocacy meetings organized in Aul, Pattamundai and Kendrapara involving PRI members, NAC members, Police officials, Mediators and owners of Beauty Parlors.
	❖ Four Crisis Management Committee meetings were organized involving T.I. Counselor , Advocate and community members
Distribution and Social Marketing of Condo	❖ 116062 persons are provided with free condoms who are identified in indulging with unsafe practices with multi partners.
	❖ Condoms are procured and distributed through Peer Educators in 14 outlets. Total 1710 condoms were sold this year which is more than 50% in compared to last year. It proves that stigma and shyness about condom is slowly reducing.

	❖ 677 no. of risk cases are screened for the test of syphilis under Venereal Disease Research Laboratory (VDRL).
	❖ 62 nos. of persons with risk/FSWs were counseled and treated through Private Preferred Provider (PPP) Clinic and reduced the risk.
Mass Awareness Creation	❖ General community got sensitized through observation of International Women Day and Rally by the college students in Kendrapara.

Brave young lady fought against all odds

A young lady was leading a happy family with her husband and two kids at Erasma of Jagatsinghpur district, adjacent to Kendrapara. But the super cyclone in 1999 spoiled everything. She lost her husband and kids. In search of livelihood & shelter she moved here & there. With much difficulty she reached Kendrapara town and got engaged in a road side dhaba to earn her bread. But fortune did not smile and the agony did not end there. The dhaba owners and other ruffians made her life hell by engaging her in sex works. Within a span of three years she became a professional sex worker. But the unsafe practice resulted infections with clear symptoms of vaginal discharge and lower abdominal pain. The regular clients started to abandon her. Anticipating a disaster she gathered courage and contacted with one of the Peer Educators of VARRAT who made her aware on the services provided under the project and safe sex practices. With the facilitation of that Peer Educator, she made HIV test. Fortunately it was found negative. Due to regular treatment she got cured the infection which she had. Now she is leading a normal life leaving the sex work. For her livelihood she is working as a Tailoring Instructor. She is also taking a lead role in motivating other sex workers to practice safe sex and get regular medical checkups to avoid all sorts of complications.

LIFE STAGE INTERVENTIONS FOR INFANTS, CHILDREN AND YOUTHS

Odisha is one of the poverty stricken states where the status of children is in precarious situation and Kendrapara district is also not so encouraging. The fact sheet of Annual Health Survey 2012-13 substantiates that while the Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) in the state is 56 it is 58 in Kendrapara district. Similarly Neo-natal Mortality Rate in the state is 37 and in Kendrapara district it is 43, Post Neo-natal Mortality Rate in Odisha is 19 and in Kendrapara district is 15. Many of the target areas of VARRAT are situated in the sea coast where the

situation is shakier. Considering the vulnerability, VARRAT, with the support of ChildFund India has been implementing a programme with age appropriate interventions.

Healthy and Secured Infants:

This programme is intended to make the infants in the age group of 0-5, healthy & secured under the basic premise of 'right to survival and development'. The focused activities under this are enabling the community in adopting appropriate practices to ensure safe motherhood, improve survival rate of the infants and ensure growth and development of infants and children.



ECCE in Action

Handholding support and effective mobilization brought the change

Sabarapada, an interior village in Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district is inhabited by scheduled tribes. Most of them are illiterates and Education was the least priority agenda among the parents as well as the children. There is

I had a doubt that after merging of ECCE with Anganwadi, our children would be deprived of education, provided by VARRAT. But I am happy to see that I am wrong because the hand holding support and mobilization process reaped the encouraging result - Mr. Ramesh Bhakta, BM committee member

one Anganwadi Centre in the village which remained locked most of the time except food distribution. Considering this one ECCE centre was opened by VARRAT with the support of ChildFund India to impart basic education to the children. However VARRAT ECCE Instructor took an initiation to strengthen the Anganwadi Centre so the villagers would avail the better service and Govt. effort will not be wastage. Accordingly along with the BM committee members she made an intensive interaction with the CDPO, ASHA, AWW, AWW Supervisor in an interface meeting which resulted in merging both the activities under one roof. The consequence was very encouraging as the AWW worker is regular and getting involved in ECCE activities as well running the Anganwadi Centre effectively. It is now difficult to conclude whether ECCE centre has been made sustainable by linking with the Anganwadi Centre or Anganwadi Centre amalgamated the ECCE centre for a larger coverage in a sustainable manner.

Educated and Confident Children:

With a view to enabling the children/adolescents 'educated and confident' within the age group of 6-14 years, under the basic premise of 'right to protection and participation', interventions are focused on quality education without corporal punishment system, life skill education, and promotion of child friendly environments.

Special coaching centre enable the children to make reentry to school

Baghuamedi, a village situated in the sea coast of Mahakalapara block of Kendrapara district is predominantly inhabited by poor tribal people who do hard labour to earn their bread. Education seems to be a negligible area of concern among the adults and the children too which is evident from their long absence from the school. Seeing this team of VARRAT tried their best to motivate the parents and children to go to school for education. With the untiring effort many children made reentry to the

school but in no time they lost their interest as they did not cope with the education curriculum especially in the subjects of Mathematics, English and Odia. Therefore VARRAT, with the support of ChildFund India, has established a temporary coaching centre with a teacher to guide and educate the children to match the course of the schools.

The centre ran for nearly seven months and created a break through. All the 20 children,

provided with free coaching, are now going to school regularly and the free coaching centre has been withdrawn by VARRAT.

Skilled and involved youth:

Youth hood is one of the important stages in the human life cycle. This is the stage when human being is being blessed with power, vigour, leadership and the inspiration to achieve. This is time they need direction and guidance to do some constructive for them as well as for the society. With this belief VARRAT is sincerely trying to enhance the skills & potentials of youths in the target area with specially designed activities.

Dream comes true

Samson Behera, a young boy of Tankibellary village of Mahakalapara block of Kendrapara district had to discontinue his study after 12th and search for engagement due to poor financial condition of his family. Lack of skill was the main hindrance to get any job. However he came across with the team members of VARRAT who helped him to take admission in ITI centre in Marshaghai and his labour & perseverance made the task completed. Now he is gainfully engaged in "Jindal Company" ESSAR Project India PVT. Ltd. With a monthly remuneration of Rs.7000/-. When contacted, beaming Samson divulged "I was dreaming to work as a mechanic in a established Company since my childhood. But my education and family condition had diverted me to a different path. Due to guidance of VARRAT I could come to right track and my dream comes true now".



Sponsor Relation Activities:

Individual sponsors both inside the country and abroad play a vital role in supporting child focused interventions through sponsoring the children. Therefore the relationship with the sponsors is very much important as they have every right to know the development of the children they sponsor. With the enrollment of 634 and 457 sponsored children the child focused interventions with ChildFund India are being implemented in Mahakalapara block of Kendrapara district. The main achievements during the reported period are mentioned below.

- ❖ Child Verification System has been done twice for 634 children within an interval of six months.
- ❖ Sponsor Day is celebrated with 698 children participants which includes the alumni + enrolled children.
- ❖ Parents awareness program on sponsorship programme in 4 villages are conducted.
- ❖ Quality letter writing workshops for children in 2 clusters are organized to enhance the quality of letters to sponsors.
- ❖ Staff orientation programme was organized on quality SR Management.



If there is will there is way

Sankar Mandal, youngest among four children of a poor family of Boulakani village of Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district was deprived of education because of penury of his family. Seeing the interest and talent all the villagers requested the think tank of VARRAT to make some arrangement for his study. Way back in 2006 VARRAT has enrolled this boy who got sponsored in 2007. With the support he did not look back. In the year 2013 he came out with flying colours in HSC examination with 82% marks. He pursued higher study and completed Diploma in Mechanical Engineering 2016 and securing 80% marks. In the campus interview he got good rank and got the opportunity to work Tractor India Pvt. Ltd. as a Trainee Engineer in Kolkata, West Bengal with a remuneration of Rs 21,500.00 per month. He is now an example in his village.



Child Centered Disaster Risk Reduction (CCDRR)

VARRAT in partnership with Child Fund launched the project aiming at strengthening local capacity for Child Centered Disaster Risk Reduction in Odisha.



The project is being executed since July 2017 in 20 village communities named (Nuafeld, West Sunity, Panchagochia, Kandarapatia, Kantilo, Benakandha, North Jamboo, Badapala, Bagagahan, Kanspala, Ambelary, Olopada, Boulakani, Arunnagar, Betabelary, Baghuamed, Lunaghery, Lunimathia, Petechella, Sabarpada) covering 5 Gram Panchayats in Mahakalpara Block of Kendrapara district in Odisha targeting 560

direct children beneficiaries, 312 direct adult beneficiaries and 4668 indirect beneficiaries. The achievements are as follows;

- ❖ Concept sharing meeting in all villages was organized, experience of villagers shared and their cooperation solicited to effectively implement the programmes. Baseline survey has been conducted.
- ❖ DRR Startup Workshop on strengthening local capacity for child centered disaster risk reduction for Program Leaders organised at BBSR by Disaster Specialist of ChildFund India.
- ❖ Training on Child Protection in Emergencies (CPIE) for Staffs facilitated by Mrs. Varsha Sharma expert in CPIE at ChildFund Delhi office.



- ❖ Training on Participatory Vulnerability Capacity Analysis (PVCA) for partner staff organised for five days out of which two days spent for field exercise.



- ❖ Community level PVCAs (including ICDS) and its analysis organised in all the 20 villages by the Project Staff. Total 1012 participants (Enrolled children-133, sibling 114 Non-enrolled children-278, and parents -487) attended in 3 days community level PVCA.
- ❖ School risk/vulnerability assessments and analysis undertaken in all the 23 schools in Project area. Total 746 participants (Enrolled children-124, sibling 137 Non-enrolled children-352, other stakeholders like teachers, SMC members-133) attended the program.



- ❖ Formation and strengthening of Child Groups (CGs), Child Protection Center (CPCs), Village Disaster Management Committee (VDMC) and mothers group organised and reorganized in all 20 villages. All the VDMC in villages reorganized.
- ❖ Training to Anganwadi Workers on disaster risk reduction and contingency planning organised for 30 AWW workers. Participants were trained

on Child centered DRR concept like Risk, Hazard, Vulnerability and Capacity on how to identify the risks at ICDS level, tools for the preparation of action plan and how ICDS can work as an umbrella for Child Protection for 0-5 Child.



- ❖ Formation and strengthening of school disaster response task forces organised in 19 villages for 23 schools. For three category of Task Forces like Early Warning, Search and Rescue and First Aid 589 members selected.



- ❖ Capacity building of school disaster response task forces organised in 19 centers covering all the 23 schools. 20 such programs organised where 603 participants participated and learned.



VARRAT Gramin Mahila Bikash Mahasangha

With the handholding support of VARRAT, some village women came forward to work for their economical development during the year 1995-96. Gradually in the name of VARRAT Gramin Mahila Bikash Mahasangha (VGMBM) they got united and registered themselves in 2007-08 as a separate legal entity. Making their intervention broad, besides economic activities, various social



developmental activities are also taken up. Currently there are 140 SHGs with 2100 women members in this federation. The significant accomplishments of VGMBM during the reporting period are enlisted below.

- ❖ 200 women have been trained on mushroom cultivation and incensed stick making.
- ❖ 140 SHGs have been trained on record maintenance and group building.
- ❖ 950000 INR has been given as loan to 10 member organizations for various income generating activities.
- ❖ Regular handholding support is being provided to member SHGs for gradation.
- ❖ Sharing of best practices among the member SHGs are done on regular basis.
- ❖ Under the Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana, 2100 saving accounts are opened.

- ❖ International Women's Day was observed on 8th March with participation of 500 women.
- ❖ Awareness programmes conducted for women members for Individual Household Latrine (IHL) and institutional delivery.
- ❖ In each month working committee meets to assess the activities undertaken and chalk out future plan.
- ❖ Each year accounts are audited and income tax return filed.

Primary Health Services to People

For the last couple of years VARRAT is partnering with Health and Family Welfare department of Govt. of Odisha to run the PHC (N), Batighar in Mahakalpda block of Kendrapara district under the Public Private Partnership mode. There are seven staffs including two professional doctors. The PHC makes concentrated effort to reach the public health services to the unserved people and create an enabling environment to seek and access public health services. While the broader goal is improving the management system, provide quality health services, mobilization of additional resources and widening the range of services and number of service providers, the focus so far has been to increase the number of OPD cases, reduction of child and maternal mortality ratio, increase the number of institutional delivery, ensure immunization, prevention and cure of endemic diseases, population control and gender balance. The tangible achievements are as follows.

Counselling of Pregnant Mothers & her family members:

10 counseling sessions were organized under the PHC (N) Batighar covering 152 pregnant mothers and 132 puerperal mothers and family members in order to enrich the information and knowledge

base of the community members on issues related to RCH, ANC, PNC, nutrition, home based management of childhood illness etc.

Institutional Delivery:

The institutional delivery is a significant contributor towards reduction of MMR & IMR. To promote this 53 deliveries were conducted in PHC(N), Batighar and 06 ANC mothers referred to local CHC/PHC for institutional delivery by convergence with ASHA.

Follow up Immunisation:

Immunisation protects children from a number of diseases & protects them from infirmity & disability. Some diseases which could have been fatal are kept at bay because of timely immunisation. The health workers followed up the immunisation and ensured it through home visit.

Outreach Health Camps :

One Outreach Health Camp was organised by PHC (N) Batighar at Batighar village on 30th December 2016. Four experienced doctors Dr. Narayan Sahu, Dr. Alekh Chandra Das, Dr. B.B. Samantray and Dr. Ajay Karan facilitated the programme which benefitted a total of 172 service- seekers out of which 27 are pregnant mother, 55 are children and rest 90 are adult general patients. Free medicines were provided to all the patients in this out reach health camp.



Designated Day Observance:

World Health Day -7th April 2016, World Breast Feeding Week from 1st August to 7th August 2016 and World AIDS Day- 1st December 2016 were observed in the PHC(N) premises in which 97, 115, & 105 participants were sensitized respectively on the importance of the days.

Health Check up at Dispensary (OPD Cases):

- ❖ Allopathic Services were provided to 5805 patients out of which 906 are male child, 866 are female child, 1909 are male adults, and 2124 are female adults till 15th January 2017.
- ❖ Ayush Services were provided to 3168 patients out of which 254 are male children, 280 are female children 1393 are male adults and 1241 are female adults till 15th January 2017.
- ❖ Pathology Services are provided to 1291 patients out of which 9 cases are stool test, 383 are urine test and 899 are blood test.
- ❖ Referral Services Extended
Referral services were provided to 93 patients of which 39 are males and 54 are females, who were found to be critical for better attention and care in outside hospitals.

CRECHE: A support for Children in Need

When the parents of a child are working couple, the children are often neglected. Usually health, education and nutrition are get compromised. In cases where both the parents of the children are daily labourer or marginal worker, the child is more at a receiving end. VARRAT is implementing one CRECHE Programme under Rajiv Gandhi National Creche Scheme for children of working mothers at village Lunimathia with the support of State Social Welfare Board, Govt of Odisha. At present 25



(Boys-18 + Girls-7) children in the age group of 2 to 6 are enrolled in it. A village level monitoring committee comprising of 5 members is functional. There are two creche workers and one Aya in the centre for taking all sorts of care of the children. The workers involve themselves in preparing low-cost and no-cost Teaching-Learning Materials for making the classroom transaction lively.



The activities undertaken are :

1. Exposure visit of the children to local bank, temples and market places for gaining firsthand knowledge.
2. There is a mud-pit in the campus for the development of psycho-motor and the children prepare many earthen articles by using this mud-pit.
3. During the period 12 village level committee meetings have been organised and the committee has been succeeded in developing a kitchen garden in order to cater the supplementary nutrition of the creche-coming children.

4. Health check-up camps on monthly basis and regular growth monitoring of the under-5 children on quarterly basis have ensured that no child remain in malnourished bracket.
5. Home visits are regularly organised to counsel the parents and care givers on Health and Nutrition aspects.

Programmes under taken in collaboration with NABARD:

So far the collaboration with NABARD in promoting SHGs, Financial Inclusion, Farmers Clubs and organising MEDP activities has come a long way and VARRAT continued this effort during the reporting period. The following few activities were under taken in collaboration with NABARD.

- ❖ A six days MEDP Training programme on Bee Keeping was organised by VARRAT in the Anwesana Training Hall of VARRAT at Boulakani in Kendrapara District from 21st to 26th January 2017 where in 30 Women SHG members were the participants. Mr Manas Kumar Behera, DDM, NABARD, Kendrapara and Mr Laxmidhar Mallick, Director RSETI, Chhata, Kendrapara inaugurated the Training programme in the presence of the Executive Director, VARRAT and other dignitaries of the day. Mr Goutam Nayak, the R.P. from Keonjhar facilitated the MEDP Training programme.
- ❖ Two quiz competitions among the school children were organized at Ereendei in patna Block of Keonjhar with the support of NABARD with twin purposes of assessing the awareness level of the school children on financial inclusion and developing their understanding on the said theme which could be disseminated to their family levels.
- ❖ With a view to helping the rural people avail the banking and insurance facilities with the support of NABARD, interactive workshop were organized in the field office of VARRAT at Ereendei, Keonjhar. It was participated by more than 100 SHG members, farmers and PRI representatives. Mr. S.S Chaulia, DDM, NABARD, Keonjhar participated in the Financial

Inclusion Program and facilitated the whole gamut of activities during the day. The NABARD officials made the group aware on opening of bank accounts, availing small loans, saving, bank transfer, insurance coverage including medical & accidental and other bank services with a special emphasis on Pradhan Mantri "Jan-Dhan Yojana" (PMJDY), Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana (PMJJBY), Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana (PMSBY) and Atal Pension Yojana (APY)

Facilitation of People's Organizations:

Developing and nurturing community based institutions across all its project area is one of the fundamental principles of VARRAT as expressed in its mission statement. VARRAT has been constantly striving to promote this with an objective to create community ownership and participation. Over the years some of the community institutions are playing vital roles and actively participating in the development process for bringing positive change in the society. The organizations promoted and their activities are as follows

Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (JJS):

Jana Jagruti Sanghathans (JJS) are organized in the villages to foster development with people's participation. The basic function of this group is to identify the developmental challenges in the village, develop need based village development plan and encourage people to implement the said plan. Till date 13 JJS in 13 villages of Patna Block of Erendei area and 25 JJS in 25 villages of Boulakani area in Mahakalpara Block of Kendrapara District involving 15 members(five elderly people, four women, four youth and two children) have been formed and strengthened in each village. This kind of composition creates enabling environment to address the issues of people from all age groups.

Central Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (CJJS):

Central Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (CJJS) comprising of 19 members from different clusters are actively involved in preparing the development plans and implementation of the project activities in both

the areas of Boulakani and Erendei. The CJJS used to sit once in a quarter for assessing the work progress of all the project activities. Necessary training /orientation have been organised for the strengthening of the Central JJS.



Village Level Children and Youth Clubs:

25 Village level children and youth clubs are formed and capacitated regularly in Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district. At present they are organising child led and youth led activities in their respective villages with the support from ChildFund. The Central Children and youth clubs are functional in Mahakalpara Block. During the period necessary inputs were given to strengthen the children and youth clubs.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

VARRAT takes the pride to be identified as the people's organization to work with them. We have sailed the boat successfully due to the team effort of our staff, EC members and well-wishers and timely support of the support organizations. In the coming year it will also work for its target constituencies laying emphasis on community participation, capacitating community based institutions, creating sustainable livelihood opportunities for the rural people utilizing the local resources, enabling the eligible people to access govt. social security schemes and programmes etc. However considering the context and need the programmes will be reshaped accordingly.

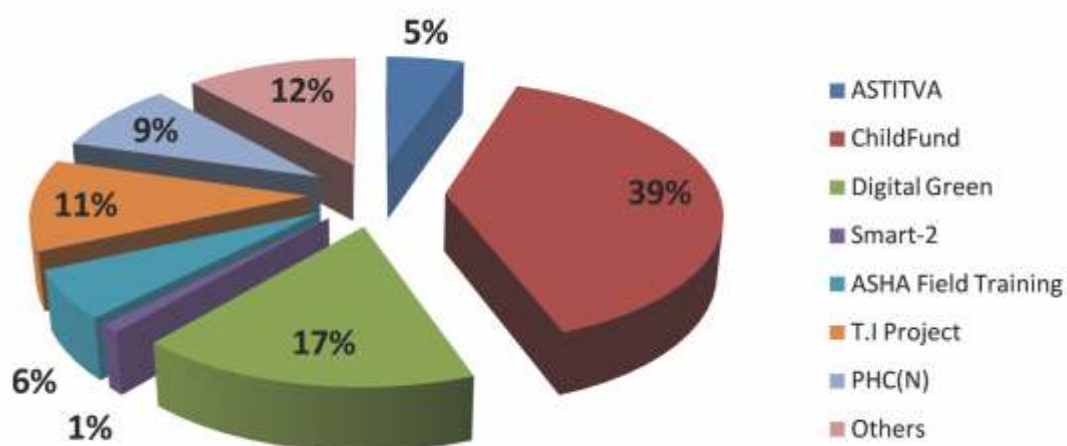

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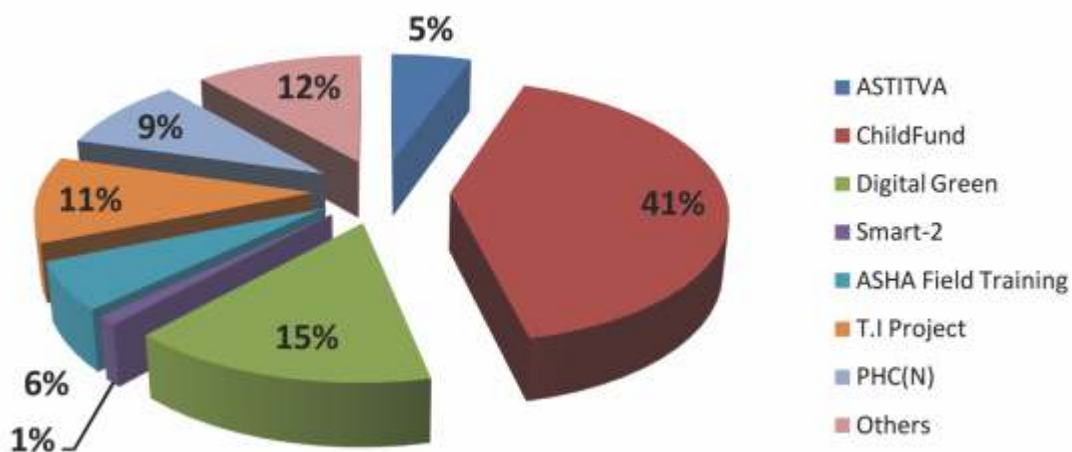
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FINANCIAL OVERVIEW 2016-17
