



Organogram




Our Target area and people:


Currently VARRAT has its programme interventions in nearly 194 villages of Mahakalpara, Pattamundai, Aul, Kendrapara Blocks of Kendrapara District and Patna, Keonjhar, Ghatgaon and Harichandanpur blocks of Keonjhar District, Odisha. It is pertinent to mention that Keonjhar district is situated in Northern part of the State in the hill pockets of Chhotnagpur Plateaue, mostly inhabited by the indigenous tribal people while Kendrapara district is located in the Eastern part coming under the coastal belt, which is prone to climatic change related natural disasters. The target constituencies are mostly marginal and underprivileged. VARRAT is currently working with total 40201 HHs with 201757 populations. Out of the total HHs nearly 44% are of STs, 7% are of SCs and 49% are of OBCs while less than 1% belongs to General. It would be significant to mention that 66% of those are below poverty line.



Climate Change and Disaster Risk Reduction Engaging Community and Children:

Climate is changing and the children are the worst sufferers. With a view to enable the vulnerable children to cope with shocks induced by natural hazards and everyday risks, a child centric project with the support of

Targeted Intervention for Prevention & Control of HIV/AIDS:

In the risk prone and notorious areas of Kendrapara, Aul and Pattamundai blocks of Kendrapara district, in collaboration with OSACS and local health officials, we have raised the awareness among the people





especially the youths of Reproductive Tract Infection (RTI), Sexual Transmitted Diseases (STD), HIV/AIDS and conducted detection and diagnostic camps with the purpose of limiting the spreading effect and reducing stigma attached to it. During this year total 458 persons are covered. The innovative strategy is taken to check the whole body and counselling through trained Peer Educators for making a significant impact in their behavioural change.

Ray of Hope

Kalyani (Pseudonym), a young lady of 25 years age used to stay happily in Kolkata with her small daughter and husband who used to run a mobile utensil selling business by vending. All the days are not similar. Without her knowledge her husband went to sex worker and got infected by AIDS. Within no time he died leaving her and the small daughter in deep Ocean of uncertainty of livelihood and future. Due to poverty she was trapped and went to hell of prostitution with unsafe sex practice. After some days because of prolonged sickness she came back to Odisha and later made the blood test. The report confirmed that she also got infected with HIV. She was silently waiting for the death. In the meantime, she could know the TI intervention of VARRAT in her village and became courageous enough to discuss with the TI staff members and due to their counselling and effort she had undergone ART registration and for CD4 test. As per the Physician's advice she is now taking medicine regularly and leading a normal life. As TI team maintains confidentiality she is not attached to any stigma and dreaming to provide a better life to her daughter.

Life Stage Interventions for Infants, Children and Youths

Every normal individual in normal condition goes through a natural life cycle. During different life stages human beings faces different challenges and problems. With the generous funding support of ChildFund India through sponsorship programme age appropriate interventions are continued on the following sectors in Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara District.

I. Healthy and Secure Infants:

Child is the future of the Nation. The development of child determines the development of the country. Hence, in this project one of the main objective is 'All children (0-5) years, pregnant & lactating mothers will have Improved Health and nutrition status', in order to guarantee the 'right to survival and right to





protection. Nutrition Garden and convergence with ICDS for strengthening the VHND system were the major highlights of the programs. In nutrition garden attempt is made to propagate the Bio-Fertiliser and Bio-Pesticides. Vegetable Seeds were supplied to 1000 families with necessary trainings. Across the year VARRAT participated in VHND sessions and through home visits the pregnant & lactating mothers were motivated to attend the VHND sessions regularly.

II. Educated and Confident Children:

This programme intends to educate and make the children confident under the age group of 6-14 years with a view to ensure their right to development. Here quality basic education and School Safety Plan are





important areas of focus of this year. School Safety Plan is traced as an important feature, which is embedded with Education as safety measure for the children. Teachers and School Community were sensitized on the aspects of potential risks for the children.

Testimonials from the field:

Rabindra of Maladiha was blessed with three daughters and one son. As Rabindra is a daily labour, he was not economically sound to afford extra cost for educating all the children. It was further compounded with his conservative mindset that imparting education to girl children is waste. Instead of education they should do the household work. With this conviction he had taken some effort to educate his son but not for the daughters. For this Pujarani, one of his daughters was about to be dropped-out from the school in Class-V though she was fair enough in study. Seeing this, the volunteers of VARRAT counselled Pujarani as well as her parents and ensured Pujarani to continue her study. She was given special attention under special support Programme that helped Pujarini to secure 70% of marks in HSC Examination in 2018-19. Pujarini is now happy and cherishes to be a nurse by doing GNM course.





III. Skilled and involved youth:

Youth is the pillar of the Nation. More the youths are skilled more the Nation will grow. Keeping this in mind, concerted effort is laid on skill building of rural youths in the target areas on mission mode. It is intended to make the youth self-dependent and work for the communities whom to they belong. Wherever necessary VARRAT has facilitated the youths to go for skill training in NSDC centres and trained some youths (boys and girls)



on its own CoE's on Computer and Tailoring skill. Life skill training more particularly on decision making skill, visioning for future has been the embedded in all the activities. The youths at the community level played a vital role in Participatory Vulnerability Capacity Assessment (PVCA) and in Mock Drills.

Baisali Pradhan, a young girl of Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara District, while making a flash back of her childhood, mentioned that her childhood was not so easy. Though she wanted to do study, it was very difficult on the part of her parents to fulfill her desire because of acute poverty. She has seen how her elder sibling also struggled to get education. However, she was lucky enough to get an overseas friend who came to her rescue through VARRAT/ChildFund. Because of that and her will power she passed matriculation and now with the support of VARRAT she is undergoing skill education on Tailoring. She believes that after the skill training, she could do her own entity and train fellow young girls of her village to stand on their own. Now she has become a source of inspiration for other girls in the village.

Balkrushna Pradhan, her father tells, "My daughter Baisali is my pride and face in the village."

IV. Sponsor relation activities:

The objective of Sponsor Relation programme is to develop healthy and meaningful relationship between the sponsor and the children. A sponsor sitting elsewhere is always interested to know about the child's development that he sponsors. Therefore, it is important to provide qualitative information to the sponsor





from time to time that helps them to understand the activities of the children and their development. At the same time it is also equally important to transmit the sponsor's feedback to the child, his family and the community. It is a two-way relationship building that strengthens the relationship bond between the two. It is pertinent to mention that there are 1485 enrolled children of which 737 are boys and 748 are girls where as total sponsored children are 847 of which 400 are boys and 447 are girls.

Livelihoods and Empowerment of the Elderly Programme

The most critical stage in human life cycle is old age. This is called as the stage of retirement and withdrawal. With the support of HelpAge India, a meaningful programme, "ASTITVA" for the elderly people above 55 years of age is being implemented in 20 villages of 6 GPs in Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district covering 862 persons of which 426 are Male and 436 are Female. Elderly people have formed 75 SHG groups and also a federation in the name of VARRAT Gramin Bayaska Swoyang Sahayak Gosthi Mahasangha (VGBSSGM). It's a great achievement that 62 of the groups have been linked with Odisha Livelihood Mission (OLM).

Up-scaling Participatory Action and Videos for Agriculture and Nutrition:

UPAVAN is a unique demonstrative project on improved agricultural practices for optimization of nutrition intake of families, implemented in Patna, Keonjhar (Sadar), Ghatagaon and Harichandanpur blocks of



Keonjhar district. The main objective is Identifying and exploring barriers and opportunities to optimize Nutrition-Sensitive Agriculture (NSA), Maternal Infant Young Children Nutrition (MIYCN) and PLA. The project is backed by a multi-partner consortium in collaboration with Ekjut, financially supported by LSHTM (London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine) through Digital Green and with the technical support of UCL (University College of London) & D-Cor (Development Corner),

Bhubaneswar, SPRING/JSI-USA, USAID. The

innovative strategy applied here is to shoot the videos of achievements by the local volunteers acted by the local village people and sharing with the communities for better adaptation of the demonstrated successful models on home-based nutrition gardens to combat mal-nourishment and nutritional deficiencies among the mothers and children. While the NSA videos talk of propagating nutrition specific agriculture "cultivation & consumption", the MIYCN video talks more about



the health seeking behaviour, "do & don'ts" during pregnancy and lactation, nurturing infants, complementary and supplementary feeding practices, exclusive breast feeding, diet during pregnancy and lactating period etc.

The project contributed significantly to the local farming families to adopt sustainable agricultural practices in small land holding and backyards to get both economic and nutritional benefits especially to the pregnant and lactating mothers and children.

Small videos made lots of difference:

Jayanti Mahanta, a lady of Nuagaon village of Patna Block of Keonjhar District revealed that a small video changed the behavioral practice of her as well as her mother-in-law. She explained that since she

was pregnant, her mother-in-law was strictly supervising her diet routine. She had no ill intention but was taking extra care for her and unborn baby. But indeed she was not a nutrition expert and exercising her traditional wisdom. It continued till she gave birth to a girl child. The weakness in her was quite visible and also in the child. Seeing this, she contacted the members of Maa Binapanini SHG and the staff members of VARRAT. Accordingly a video show, "Maternal diet during lactation and addressing barriers", was arranged for her as well as her mother-in-law which was followed by a counseling session. By watching this, her



mother-in-law was convinced to change her mindset and behavioral practice which allowed her to take proper nutritional diet and now she and her daughter, who is now of seven months are sound and active.

Increasing productivity of rice based cropping system & farmer's income:

A short term but meaningful pilot project, in collaboration with Foundation for Ecological Security (FES) is implemented in Patna block of Keonjhar district. The main purpose is to increase the farmer's income





through enhancing production in rice based cropping system. The encouraging result envisaged under this, has laid a founding stone to march forward.

VARRAT Gramin Mahila Bikash Mahasangha

It was the year 1995 when some needy enterprising village women came forward to work for their economic



development. VARRAT provided the necessary accompaniment and their association got formally registered in the year 2007-08 in the name of VARRAT Gramin Mahila Bikash Mahasangha (VGMBM). Currently there are 140 SHGs with 2100 women members in this federation. During this period 850000 INR has been given as loan to members while 9,27,000 INR is the loan repayment from its members. 250 women have been trained on mushroom cultivation, incense stick making and sanitary napkin making. Apart from economic activities, they are also involved in village developmental and social activities like ensuring drinking water in scarce areas during summer, assisting needy families

meeting social obligations and conducting village level get together. The major breakthrough is LEEP a national level SHG Federation that extended support to VGMBM for the celebration of International Women's Day where overwhelmingly more than 200 SHG members participated and the Sarapancha of Boulakani Panchayat Mrs. Sujata Samal graced the

occasion.

Capacity Building of ASHAs

Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) play vital roles in the ground level under National Health Mission (NHM) for providing Maternal Child Health Care as well as facilitating institutional health services in the rural areas. This year 105 ASHAs from Mahakalpara & Marshaghai Block were trained on Population Based Screening on Common Non-





Communicable diseases in four batches during August & December 2018 with the support from the Mission. Each batch contained 5 days residential program under the guidance and supervision of the District Health Administration & VARRAT.

Facilitation of People Organization:-

Developing and nurturing community based institutions across all its project area is one of the cross cutting intrinsic programmes of VARRAT. This is based on the premises of program implementation by involving community so that they will get a feeling of ownership in driving the activities. Followings are the community institutions, which are playing vital roles and actively participating in the process for bringing positive changes in the society.

I. Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (JJS):-

VARRAT has organised the community members and facilitated the promotion of Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (JJS) in each village. The basic function of each group is to identify the developmental challenges in the village, prepare need-based village development plan and implement the same. Till date 16 JJS in 16 villages of Patna Block of Erendei area and 25 JJS in 25 villages of Boulakani area in Mahakalpara Block have been formed & strengthened. Process for the formation of JJS in new 21 villages initiated and primary meetings with the villagers have been organised. Each village level JJS comprising of 15 members including five elderly people, four women, four youths and two children. This kind of composition creates enabling environment to address the issues of people from all age categories.

II. Central Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (CJJS):-

Central Jana Jagruti Sanghathan (CJJS) comprising of 19 members representing different clusters is formed to chalk out area developmental plans and implementing programmes in both the areas of Boulakani and Erendei. The CJJS takes stock once in a quarter by reviewing the work progress of all the project activities. Necessary capacity building programmes are also organized for CJJS members. At present, both the CJJSs are actively involved in village developmental process in both the areas.

III. Village Level Forest Protection Committee:-

22 village forest committees are formed in Patna Block to Protect and conserve their village forests. Time to time orientation and awareness programmes are organized for them on forest protection issues. The Forest Committees are actively discharging their duties in coordination with Government functionaries.

IV. Village Level Children and Youth Clubs:-

50 Village level children clubs (25 in each area of Boulakani and Erendei), 11 Kalyani clubs for girls in 11 villages and 25 youth clubs in 25 villages of Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district are formed and they are being capacitated in regular intervals. Because of this the youth club members are able to participate and place their opinions in different platforms and engaged in youth-led activities. Similarly Kalyani club members are maintaining personal hygiene and also generating awareness among their peer groups. Both youth club members and Kalyani club members are actively involved in Swachha Bharat Abhiyan to make their villages clean and green. Youth Clubs and Kalyani Clubs are being linked with Neheru Yuva Kendra and 15 of them (11 YC and 4 KC) are receiving supports from NYK for development.

25 child Clubs are formed in all 25 program villages. A federation of the child club has been established in the name of 'Nabodaya Sishu Mahasngha'. The representatives of the club are representing the Child Protection Committees of the villages. Now the process of strengthening the child club is being initiated with new and advanced thought process.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

The year 2018-19 has been a fruitful year for VARRAT, during which it undertook need-based activities for the targeted communities that included women empowerment, education, environment, youth empowerment, curative and preventive health care, care of the aged and person with disability, prevention



of AIDs and other socially related relevant programmes with more focus on right based activities. With the limited resources we tried our best to sustain our programme focus and with the support of people we have overcome all hurdles.

We express our sincere thanks to all our donors such as ChildFund India, digital GREEN, HelpAGE India, IGSSS, OVHA, UNIFEF, OSACS, Health and Family Welfare Department (NHM), SSWB/ CSWB, NABARD etc who have always been a source of inspiration for us. More than the financial support we value their pragmatic guidance in the field of programme planning & execution. We extend our gratitude to our board members, advisers, well-wishers, bankers, community members and volunteers for their invaluable guidance and inputs to the growth and development of the organization. 


